Annotation
The course is devoted to the analysis of the historical development of economic integration in the European Union (EU), the functioning of the single market, its economic consequences and the measures and results of the harmonization of the economic policies of the member states. The doctoral student will gain knowledge of EU economic integration and the ability to analyze various EU economic policies and instruments: common markets for goods, services, capital and labor, customs union, competition and external economic relations policy, monetary union and monetary policy, coordination of fiscal policies of member states, tax harmonization, transport, energy and environmental policies, regional and common agricultural policies, decision-making and long-term programming, and the EU's resilience to emerging crises. The study of this subject will strengthen the doctoral student's values in relation to the principles of the EU, such as free and fair trade, sustainable development, poverty reduction, human dignity and equality.
